I know that many of you are juggling your own work, caring for vulnerable family members and other responsibilities on top of home schooling. I want to assure you all that whatever you can manage, it's enough.

It is very easy during these times to compare yourselves with others and it is easy to forget that every family's circumstance is different. **Please do not put pressure on yourselves**, the work sent home is for you to access to the extent that you can. We do not have an expectation about how much you should get through because we are acutely aware that some of you are trying to fit it into your lunch hour.

If you are struggling to get through large chunks of work in a day, here are some hints and tips to help you make the most of the time you do have:

- Start early- Get work done straight after breakfast. This is often when children are most alert and receptive
- Work in small blocks- 3 or 4 focussed 20 minute sessions throughout the day can have more impact than you think
- Work on the basics- if time is a challenge focus on the basics. Keep children reading, writing and practicing those all-important maths fluency skills

The most important thing is that children are safe and happy so please, don't be hard on yourselves.



listed our Christian values in the hope that they would help others in the area. Thank you Eden!








Arthur, Jacob and Theo (Y1) have been creating treasure maps for each other. They have written instructions for each other to follow. What great teamwork from afar!
